



USE THE STAR METHOD TO SHINE

The **STAR** method is an effective way of providing **evidence** that you have the employability skills an employer is looking for.



SITUATION



What was the situation?

TASK



What was the task or objective?



ACTION



What did you do?



RESULT



What was th outcome?



S - Situation

Describe a situation that you were in or a task that you needed to accomplish.

- You must describe a **specific** event or situation, not a generalised description of what you have done in the past.
- Be sure to give enough detail for the Interviewer to understand the context of the situation.
- This situation can be from a previous job, from a volunteer experience, or any **relevant** event.



T - Task

Describe the **task** or **goal** you were trying to achieve.

• What did you have to do?



A - Action

Describe the actions you took using an appropriate amount of detail and keep the focus on YOU.

- What specific steps did you take and what was your particular contribution?
- Be careful that you don't describe what the team or group did when talking about a project, but what **you** actually did.
- Use the word "I", not "We" when describing actions taken by you.



R - Result

Describe the outcome of your actions and don't be shy about taking credit for your behaviour and efforts!

- What happened? How did the event end? What did you accomplish? What did you learn?
- Make sure that you follow all parts of the **STAR** method. Be as **specific** as possible at all times, without rambling or including too much information.







EXAMPLE OF HOW TO USE THE STAR METHOD



Interview Question

Tell me about a time when you incurred a challenge and how you dealt with it.



Situation (S)

Hotel venue costs had risen and ticket sales for the CIT Business & Humanities Ball were not sufficient to cover the cost of a band.



Task (T)

As a member of the organising committee, my goal was to find a way to provide really good quality music with a very limited budget.



Action (A)

I advertised an opportunity through CIT Social Media resources for CIT students who were DJs or members of a band to do auditions to play for the night. I noted that a fee would not be paid, however, expenses would be covered and the successful band/DJ would be guaranteed a series of gigs and promotion for the following year. Five bands applied, and two bands and a DJ were selected by the committee for the ball.



Result (R)

The night was very successful, we ran the event within budget, and everyone seemed to enjoy the music. I was also delighted that a new practice for using CIT musical talent was established!
