Bachelor of Arts in Community Development Community Development is a process that seeks to build strong, sustainable communities by bringing people and groups together for the good of the wider community and society. Based on principles of equality, fairness and respect it sets out to influence power structures and remove barriers that prevent people from taking part in decisions that affect their lives.

Community workers represent the voices and needs of target groups and disadvantaged communities to policy makers at local and national level.

Starting Your Job Search

Job search takes focus, effort and commitment. It's essential that you create a strong online presence. You need to have a LinkedIn profile and work at building your network. LinkedIn is about where you want to go, not just about what you are doing now. An ideal starting point is to look for **Alumni** (former graduates of your college/course). You should also look for **people in** organisations you want to target. Aim to find the name of the HR Manager and employees in roles you are aiming for yourself, what jobs have they had so far? Don't wait for jobs to be advertised, actively look for roles that interest you.

It is useful to research **Government funding programmes** such as those national and EU funds administered by Pobal (www.pobal.ie) E.g. SICAP, RDP, RSS. Tus, CSP etc. and find out where they are rolled out in your job search area. Many Community Development posts will be funded under these programmes.

Professional Groups & Associations

Membership of a professional association is a useful way to meet new people in your field and will look good on your CV. Many professional bodies have jobs boards and these roles may not be advertised elsewhere.

Postgraduate Study

It is common for community development workers to pursue their own continuing professional development by undertaking a further qualification.

Relevant subjects may include: Voluntary sector studies, Youth and community, Social studies, Social policy, Housing practice, Business and community studies, Legal studies, Public health/ community health, Management, Counselling and Psychotherapy.

Most of these courses will bring graduates to a Level 8 (honours level) degree opening up opportunities to progress to Masters level and possibly gain a professional qualification.

Note: significant relevant experience in a field in addition to the BA (level 7) can sometimes open up eligibility to gain a place on a relevant Master's degree programme.

*Guideline: Always contact the course co-ordinator of a postgraduate course to check eligibility!

There are many wide and varied options which one can pursue, including;

Higher Diploma in Relationship Mentoring UCC Level 8 Higher Diploma in Sociology UCC 1yr FT/ 2yrs (PT) Level 8 Higher Diploma in Social Personal Education WIT (PT) Level 8 MA in Social and Personal Education WIT (PT) Level 9
