# **Career Options**



Think of your first job as the first step in your professional career where what you learn will lead to your next job. You may decide to go freelance and work for yourself or you may work in one context or move between various contexts in the first couple of years after graduation. The goal is to continue to develop your creativity and skills through experience.

Job opportunities include **wo**rking for an in-house design team, in a large or small advertising or branding agency; a large or small independent design studio, or other specialist creative agency, such as photography, **3D** design and e-Learning. Many graphic design positions come up inhouse, in a variety of organisations, for example: 'inhouse designer – Bewley's'.



Employers are creative agencies such as branding and marketing firms, independent design studios, as well as specialists in 3D design, animation, e-Learning, games development, interactive design and audio technology.

# Starting Job Search

Job search takes effort and commitment. It's essential that you can be found online. Include links to your work on your LinkedIn profile page and on your CV -Behance is a popular portfolio sharing platform. Don't wait for jobs to be advertised, actively look for roles.

Look for Alumni (former graduates of CIT and your course) and for contact names in companies you'd like to work in. Who is the HR Manager? Can you find graphic designers working there? Look at their career background to get an idea of possible steps to your goal. Tip: look at designers and studios that you want to work in, including international – aim high – get in contact with them.

Graduate programmes offer a career starting point as extra training is provided. A Level 8 degree is the minimum for entry and many are open to graduates of all disciplines. Register with GradIreland: https://gradireland. com/user.
